Dear Friends of the Center,

2015-16 marks the 20th anniversary of the Center for the Study of Gender and Sexuality. Founded in 1996 as the Center for Gender Studies, the CSGS has developed over the last two decades into a vibrant intellectual community that serves an increasingly diverse and interdisciplinary group of scholars. We are planning a wide array of events to celebrate and assess the development of gender and sexuality as a distinctive field of inquiry at UChicago and to brainstorm on future trajectories. The anniversary also presents an opportunity to expand our efforts to enlarge our newly created endowment and put the Center on sound financial footing. Taking a historical view of the role of women at the University, on **November 5** the CSGS will host **Hanna Holborn Gray**, former president of the University and professor of history emeritus. Professor Gray will discuss the reissue of *More than Lore: Reminiscences of Marion Talbot*, originally published in 1936, for which she has written a new foreword.

Talbot was the dean of women at the University from 1895 to 1925 and co-founder of what would become the American Association of University Women. *More than Lore* is a firsthand account of the early days of the University and a fascinating look at life as an early twentieth-century college woman and the foundations of the modern undergraduate experience.

On **November 18** at 6pm, we welcome alumni, students and faculty to a special screening of the film *Regarding Susan Sontag* followed by a discussion led by Professor Deborah Nelson, former Faculty Director of the Center, where we will explore the life and work of the famous writer, filmmaker and political activist, **Susan Sontag**, AB'51 who is among UChicago's best known alumni.

This year we will continue the series on *Sexual Violence on Campus*. On **October 28**, the Center will host **Jennifer Doyle** to speak on "Campus Sex/Campus Security: The Psychic Skin of the University." We are in the planning stages of an event to discuss the results of Spring 2015 Climate Survey on sexual misconduct at the University. This important re-

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port now serves as the basis for developing pragmatic and effective strategies for combatting the myriad forms of sexual misconduct that damage individual lives and impair student's access to an equal education. I urge you to read the published results and to voice your concerns.

The ongoing **Precairous Citizenship Series** will focus in 2015-16 on the attacks on reproductive rights and the implications for the exercise of full citizenship. Together with the Law School, we are thrilled to cosponsor **Cecile Richards**, President of Planned Parenthood, in January, who will speak to the current crisis faced by this crucial provider of women's health care and to the challenges ahead. We are also excited to host **Katha Pollitt**, whose "Subject to Debate" column in the Nation regularly addresses crucial feminist issues. In both a workshop and a public lecture, Pollitt will discuss the central themes of her politically astute and powerful 2015 book *Pro: Reclaiming Abortion Rights*. These events will fill up fast so be sure to stay tuned for signup information.

Among other events in the planning for 2016 are a Spring CSGS fellows' reunion with panel discussions on activism and scholarship inside and outside the academy culminating with a party over Alumni Weekend (June 3-4, 2016), the Feminist Queer Praxis series featuring Gender and Sexuality Studies alum who have gone on to amazing careers in the arts, special distinguished alumni and distinguished faculty lectures, and a symposium featuring some of the Center's founding faculty and students.

Our fabulous faculty are planning some great events and series - Lauren Berlant and Kristen Schilt will lead the **LGBTQ Studies Project** and we are fortunate to have Lauren Berlant curate the **Artists' Salon** series while Professor Hillary Chute is on leave. Jennifer Wild will again lead the **Counter Cinema/Counter Media** project. Kristen Schilt and Patrick Jagoda will organize **Alternate Realities and Virtual Worlds**, a series on gaming at the Center.

The Gender and Sexuality Studies Workshop's theme for fall quarter is "**Playing in Relation**," and has been curated by Patrick Jagoda. The first workshop is Tuesday, October 6th when Professor Jagoda will discuss his paper, "Experimental Games: Gamification, Affect, and Non-sovereign Play". The Winter and Spring faculty curators of the workshop are Amanda Sharkey (Booth School of Business) and Sonali Thakker (English), respectively.

Be sure to stop by the Center at noon on **October 6** for a dynamic workshop with **Julieta Paredes**, Bolivian feminist activist, writer, singer, author and poet, introduced by Professor Agnes Lugo-Ortiz. Finally be sure to join the CSGS and the Center for the Study of Race, Politics and Culture for our annual open house on **October 7**, 4:30-6 pm. There will be light fare, drinks and great opportunities to meet other scholars in gender, sexuality and critical race studies. We look forward to seeing you there!

Courses 2015-16

CSGS will offer several free-standing courses this year, including "Gendering Privacy" and "Theories of Sexual Violence in American Culture" in the winter and "Women Possessed: Religion, Gender, and Sexuality in Early America" and "Gender, Sexuality, and Islamic Traditions" in the spring.

CSGS' core (general education requirement) offering, "Gender and Sexuality in World Civilizations, Parts I and II, continues and has expanded to three sections this year, taught in the autumn by Susan Burns and Tara Zahra, both of History, and Alison James of French and in the winter by Sonali Thakkar of English, Kristen Schilt of Sociology, and Susan Gal of Anthropology.

Luis Manuel Garcia, Hormel Fellow in 2010-11, has been hired as a (permanent) lecturer at the University of Birmingham (UK), where he will also work on developing a new program on "Global Popular Musics." Ainsley LeSure, CSGS-CSRPC dissertation fellow in 2012-13 and CSGS BA Preceptor 2013-15, is beginning her term as a Collegiate Assistant Professor in the Social Sciences here at the university. The Workshop features a quarterly theme curated by a faculty member and papers are pre-circulated. The Working Group is a forum for graduate students to workshop research and writing at any point in the progress of their work, as well as to request help on specific aspects of their projects.

Autumn 2015 Gender and Sexuality Studies Workshop

The Fall Quarter theme for the **Gender and Sexuality Studies Workshop** is "Playing in Relation," and has been curated by Prof. Patrick Jagoda (English). This workshop invites conversations about different cultural forms and technological platforms of play, including videogames, analog games, virtual worlds, toys, performances, playgrounds, and make-believe. How does play open up questions about affect, imagination, desire, and precariousness, especially among people at play together? How do various types of play — from power plays to sexual play to playing with identity — emerge from different cultural forms and impact understandings of gender and sexuality?
