A Note from the Director

Dear Friends of the Center,

The beginning of 2019 reminds me of a 1970s feminist slogan – “A woman’s place is in the House . . . and the Senate.” After the midterm elections, the House of Representatives gained seventeen new women, which means there are fifteen percent more women in Congress than last year. This new configuration of the House also boasts the highest number of women of color in Congress, including the first Muslim congresswoman and the first Native American congresswoman. Notably, of the thirty-six first-term congresswomen starting in 2019, only one is a Republican – an important trend in a period in which *Roe v. Wade* is likely to come under new attack. The 116th Congress in the Senate will have the highest number of all-women delegations in history, with six states being represented by two women. In other notable Senate milestones, the Senate Judiciary Committee appointed two women to serve for the first time in its history, though both are Republicans who are committed to outlawing abortion. Like 2018,

this year looks certain to bring contestation over access to legal abortion, over transgender rights, and over gender in the workplace.

In the winter quarter, CSGS will be offering a series of programs that tie into these issues. On Monday, January 14, we will launch of new series, **Gender & Work**, that seeks to interrogate why so many professional fields, such as finance, politics, and science, remain male-dominated. This series brings women and gender minorities who have extensive backgrounds in fields such as finance, business, technology, law, or medicine to reflect on their career experiences with undergraduate and graduate students. Our first event features **Dr. Shellwyn Weston**, who built her career in finance management and, after receiving a PhD from NYU Stern, now works in the fields of neuroeconomic and behavioral finance at the NYU Center for Neural Science. Dr. Weston will be in conversation with **Megan Kelly**, who worked in healthcare strategy for 9 years, first as a management consultant and then as the manager of strategy for a commu-

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nity health center before receiving her MA in Sociology from the University of Chicago in 2018. This event begins at 5pm in the Community Room of the CSGS.

On January 18, the Center's **Artist's Salon** will host a screening of *The T*, an award-winning web series created by **Bea Cordelia** and **Daniel Kyri**. *The T* follows two friends navigating romance and friendship in contemporary Chicago's queer community. Jo, a trans woman craving an increasingly elusive intimacy, and Carter, a queer Black man at odds with his conservative upbringing, converge from opposite sides of Chicago for a magical New Year's Eve. Cordelia and Kyri will be in conversation with **Aymar Jean Christian** (founder of OTV, Northwestern) and **Chase Joynt** (Banting Postdoctoral Fellow at the University of Chicago) after the screening. The event will take place at the Logan Center Screening Room (201) from 7-9pm.

As January is the 46th anniversary of Roe v. Wade, we will host a **Feminist/Queer Praxis** event organized around the landscape of abortion-providing in the United States today. On Monday, January 28, we will host **Amber Sollenberger**, a reproductive health assistant at Planned Parenthood and proud alum of our Gender and Sexuality Studies program. The event will take place from 5:30-7:00pm in the Community Room at CSGS. Stay tuned for updates on additional speakers and another FQP event in February.

February is also shaping up to be an exciting month for CSGS events. First, we will host our annual **Iris Marion Young Distinguished Faculty Lecture** with **Prof. Jennifer Wild** (Cinema and Media Studies). Prof. Wild's research centers on the history and theory of modernism and the avant-garde, with a specialization in French cinema. She is the author of *The Parisian Avant-Garde in the Age of Cinema, 1900-1923* (University of Chicago Press 2015), and teaches a range of courses including the very popular GNSE "Media Wars" course. She led a CSGS-sponsored faculty project on **Counter Cinema/Counter Media** for several years, and currently serves as our Director of Studies. Her talk is titled, "How to See One Man's Body: An Experiment in Historical Perception" and will take place on Monday, February 18 at 4:30 in the CSGS Community Room.

Continuing our tradition of the last three years, we have designated February as the "**Care@UChicago**" month. The series will feature free yoga sessions every Friday in February at noon, a series of social events, such as game nights, and a special event on Valentine's Day, February 14 from 5-7pm. We are also co-sponsoring "Queerness to the Front: Redefining Our Relationships," a workshop on building healthy behaviors in our interpersonal relationships and the broader LGBTQIA+ communities, with LGBTQ Student Life on the evening of February 11.

We are collaborating with the Office of LGBTQ Student Life and the CSRPC to bring **Alan Pelaez Lopez**, an Afro-Indigenous poet, collage, installation and adornment artist from Oaxaca, México to campus. They will facilitate "A Reclamation of our Rights," a writing workshop for people who live at the intersection of multiple oppressions, aimed at claiming back power on February 12

at the Center for Identity and Inclusion. On February 13, they will present a public talk on the work they have done at the intersections of Afro-Latinidad, Immigration and Queerness at the CSGS/CSRPC at 5pm.

As part of our continuing series on **LGBTQ Studies**, we will also host **Prof. Julietta Singh** (University of Richmond/ English & Women, Gender and Sexualities Studies) to talk about her new book, *No Archive Will Restore You* (Punctum Books, 2018), a hybrid memoir that blends theory, experience, and poetry to offer meditations on the body. Prof. Singh will be in conversation about hybrid writing practice with postdoctoral fellow **Chase Joynt**, author of *You Only Live Twice* (Carriage House Books, 2016). The event will take place on Monday, February 25 from 4:30-6:30pm. This event is rescheduled from the autumn quarter.

The Center is proud to support Intimate Provocations: Theorizing Consent in the Age of #MeToo, a mini-conference organized by **Prof. Jennifer Cole** (Comp Human Development) and graduate students **Kelsey Robbins** and **Raffaella Taylor-Seymour** (CHD) on March 15 at Wilder house. The mini-conference will examine the global circulation of discourses about consent in the wake of the #MeToo movement and consider how consent discourses are shaping conceptions and practices of intimacy, bodily autonomy, and moral decision-making. Keynote talks will be given by **Prof. Ashwini Tambe** (Dept of Women's Studies, Univ of Maryland) and **Prof. Joseph Fischel** (Dept of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies, Yale Univ) and panels will feature graduate student researchers with faculty discussants.

On January 17, the Center will co-sponsor the Pozen Family Center's Festival of Human Rights, reflecting on 70 years of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and, on March 7-8, the South Asia Graduate Conference, South Asia: The Public, the Political, and the Popular.
