

A Note from the Director

Dear CSGS students and colleagues,

Welcome back to a new academic year after what I hope has been a restorative summer! It's a pleasure and a privilege to be addressing you as the new Faculty Director of the Center. I am proud to become part of the Center's history of leadership, following upon the outstanding directorship of Kristin Schilt (Sociology), who led the Center from 2017 to 2023, and gratefully acknowledging the care and stewardship of Lucy Pick (Divinity, 2016-2017), Linda Zerilli (Gender and Sexuality Studies, Political Science, 2010-2016), Debbie Nelson (English, 2006-2009), Rebecca West (Romance Languages and Literatures, 2002-2005), George Chauncey (History, 2005-2006), Lauren Berlant (English, 1999-2002), and Leora Auslander (History, 1996-1999).

I've been at the University now for 20 years, which is hard to believe, and I have been thinking back to the circumstances of my own introduction to CSGS. The then-director invited me to lunch to try to get me involved in the Center's curriculum, events, and other activities. I demurred. My research wasn't really about gender, I told her, and my home department had made it pretty clear to whom I owed my academic labor. Well, come on by the Center anyway, she said, you'll meet people. I did indeed meet people, among whom I number some of my closest and most enduring colleagues and friends. And, my scholarship evolved as I came to understand gender not just as a category of experience in my professional life (at times an uncomfortably relevant one), but also of analysis. I would not be the human being or the scholar that I am were it not for that early outreach and my subsequent

Event Highlights

Please join us at the CSGS this fall! All our events are free, open to the public, and will be held in the Community Room on the first floor of the Center at 5733 South University Avenue, unless noted otherwise.

On Monday, October 2 from 4:30–6:00pm, we will co-host our annual welcome party, the <u>5733 Open House</u>, with the Center for the Study of Race, Politics, and Culture. And on Wednesday, October 4 from 5:00-6:30pm, we will celebrate new works by sixteen CSGS faculty affiliates at the annual <u>CSGS Faculty Book Party</u>. At both events, we'll celebrate the start of the new academic year with delicious food, beverages, and great company.

This fall's feature events will address some of the largest issues around gender and sexuality on the current political and social landscape: the future of reproductive freedom and trans people's rights. The first, *After Dobbs: Reproductive Freedom, Justice, and the Power of the State*, will address critical questions about the future of a constitutional right to abortion and the state's power over life and death, raised by the 2022 Supreme Court decision in *Dobbs v Jackson Women's Health Organization*. Michele Goodwin (Law. University of California, Irvine), Dorothy Roberts (Law and Sociology, University of Pennsylvania), and Mary Ziegler (Law, University of California, Davis) will be in conversation with Geoffrey Stone (Law, University of Chicago). The forum will take place on Tuesday, October 10 from 5:00-6:30 pm at Glen A. Lloyd Auditorium, located in the University of Chicago Law School (1111 E 60th St).

In November, Jules Gill-Peterson (History, Johns Hopkins, and author of Histories of the Transgender Child) will visit campus as part of the OUTstanding Speaker Series, an annual distinguished lecture series that brings to campus scholars, professionals, and public figures who have made significant contributions to the LGBTQ community. On Thursday, November 2 at 5:00pm, Gill-Peterson will present "Great Society Transsexualism: On the Political Economy of Transition." The abstract for this lecture is as follows: "The escalating political violence accompanying trans people's hypervisibility is often framed as a front in a 'culture war,' even a distraction from capitalist crises of stagnant wages, inflation, and record wealth inequality. The dominant defense of trans people's rights, meanwhile, shrinks the real conditions of their existence into private matters of psychology and medical gatekeeping. Instead of responding by idealizing trans precarity as resistance to gender norms or state power, this lecture critically traces the genealogy of these frames by reconsidering the concept of 'transition' through its political-economic function, one forged in the 1960s and through intense alignment with the Great Society welfare state."

Looking ahead to Winter quarter, we are excited to announce that Professor Kimberly Kay Hoang (Sociology) will deliver the *Iris Marion Young Distinguished Faculty Lecture*, an annual event featuring the work of UChicago faculty. The talk is titled, "Spiderweb Capitalism: How Global Elites Exploit Frontier Markets" and will be held Thursday, January 25 from 5:00-6:30 pm.

GNSE Major and Minor

Undergraduate students are very interested in Gender and Sexuality Studies (GNSE) – our major has almost doubled over the last few years with 55 total declared majors and minors at the end of 2023. Autumn 2023 Courses

Our Core offering, Gender and Sexuality in World Civilizations, has once again expanded. Not only did we add another section-our 10th--but they are all fully enrolled, and we also have a full group of 25 on our second Study Abroad offering underway in London this quarter. GNSE Civ I on campus will be chaired by Professor Daisy Delogu (our new Faculty Director) this Autumn and she will also be teaching a section. The remaining sections are being taught by Professor Ghenwa Hayek (Near Eastern Languages and Civilization), our new Instructional Professor Red Tremmel (History), returning Teaching Fellow Jordan Johansen (Classics/ GNSE), returning Lecturer Rhiannon Auriemma (Political Science at Northwestern) and new Teaching Fellows Olivia Bustion (Divinity), Sarah McDaniel (English), and Stephanie Painter (History). Lina Maria Ferreira Cabeza-Vanegas (Creative Writing), Cate Fugazzola (Global Studies) and Linda Zerilli (Political Science) are the faculty who are each teaching one section of our abroad experience.

Professor Kristen Schilt is returning to teaching our required major/minor course, Theories of Sexuality and Gender, with PhD candidate Melina Davis (Comparative Human Development). Social Science Teaching Fellow (SSTF) Paula Martin (CHDV/GNSE) is returning in our B.A. Preceptor role. This is the first year that the BA is optional for the major (but required for honors) and most of our students are choosing to complete a thesis as a capstone of their undergraduate experience. In addition to Theories, we are also offering three 'Foundations' courses this Autumn. Red Tremmel, our new Instructional Professor, is teaching Introduction to Gender Studies, with Introduction to Sexuality Studies to follow in Winter. Zoya Sameen (SSTF, CRES/GNSE), will teach the very popular Gender, Sexuality and Sports course for a second time and Malavika Parthasarathy (JSD in Law) will be teaching Global Perspectives on Reproductive Justice: Theory and Practice. Additionally, we have cross-listed 37 undergraduate courses and 19 graduate courses, giving our students a wide variety of options.

CSGS Graduate Certificate
