Dear Friends of the Center,

We are excited this quarter to feature two events that are celebrating the intellectual contributions of Center co-founder Prof. Lauren Berlant, who passed away in 2021. On April 13th and 14th, we will have our inaugural Lauren Berlant Memorial Lecture, our joint endeavor with the Department of English. Our keynote speaker will be Prof. Paul Lisicky (Rutgers University-Camden), whose most recent book, Later: My Life at the Edge of the World, is a memoir documenting his time living in Provincetown, MA during the height of the AIDS crisis in the 1990s. Prof. Lisicky will give a keynote lecture on Thursday, April 13 at 5:00pm, titled "LATER and SOONER: The Long Legacy of HIV." On Friday, April 14 at 12:30pm, he will run a small writing workshop titled "On Urgency" (RSVP required). In addition to this new series, we are co-sponsoring the inaugural Lauren Berlant 3CT Graduate Conference on April 21st and 22nd. The theme of the conference is "Power over Life and Death: Feminism, Abolition, and the State." Prof. Sarah Haley and Prof. Sophie Lewis will give keynote lectures. We hope you can join us in these events that will continue to develop the important intellectual contributions of Prof. Lauren Berlant.

We will continue our "Changing Women in a Changing Society" virtual panel discussions in Spring quarter. On Monday, April 24th at 5pm CST, we will host a panel on "Gender, Policing, and the State," which will feature Prof. Susila Gurusami (UIC), Prof. Shannon Malone Gonazalez (University of North Carolina), and Prof. Saher Selod (Simmons College). #### **Spring Courses**

This quarter, **Rhiannon Love Auriemma** (PhD Political Science, Northwestern University), who taught multiple sections of Gender and Sexuality in World Civilizations for us in Winter Quarter, will be teaching a stand-alone class entitled, "Contemporary Feminist Politics: From the Sex Wars to Beyonce." # **CSGS Summer Internships**

Each summer CSGS provides funding for undergraduates who are interested in internships that focus on advocacy, service, or activism for women and LGBTQ communities. This summer, we are funding three students: Ellie Gilbert-Bair, Daphne Hoang, and Leticia Mercado. We're so pleased with this group of students who are interested in a wide variety of issues, including reproductive rights, LGBTQ media, and inclusive sex education. As students don't need to know their placements to apply, we'll be working together through Spring Quarter to find them opportunities that will relate to their interests while also helping them figure out how they might integrate gender and sexuality into their work after college. #### **Research Grants Funded**

We continue to offer research and travel grants on a quarterly basis. In Winter Quarter we had a very large applicant pool and were able to award five grants to graduate students and two to undergraduate students in support of their thesis/dissertation research. Booth PhD student Sinja Leonelli received funding for her dissertation surveys, and MAPSS students Dahlia Deng, Francis Fabre, Ann Jiang and Matthew Temple all received research grants to fund portions of their MA theses. Gabi Kinlock (Critical Race and Ethnic Studies/English) and our own JQ Lee (Gender and Sexuality Studies) received funds to support their BA theses. Congratulations to everyone! Our final grant deadline (which includes two \$2,500 grants for PhD students) is April 17.

# Ruth Murray BA Thesis Prize in Women's Studies, Feminist Criticism, Gender or Sexuality Studies

Sunday, May 7 is the deadline for undergraduate students to submit their BA theses for consideration for the Ruth Murray BA Thesis Prize in Women's Studies, Feminist Criticism, Gender or Sexuality Studies. In past years the prize has been open to any essay written by an undergraduate but moving forward it will be awarded to the best thesis written by a University of Chicago undergraduate student in the area of women's studies, feminist criticism, gender or sexuality studies. The \$500 prize sponsored by the CSGS is in memory of **Ruth Murray**, who died in 1991, having serving as Bibliographer for the Education, Psychology, Sociology and Women's Studies Collections at the Regenstein Library for many years. Ruth Murray had a strong interest in encouraging scholarship in women's studies and often served as a stimulus and facilitator of work by students and faculty in the area. It is the intent of the Ruth Murray Prize Committee that the essay competition sustains and encourages scholarship in gender and sexuality studies, as Ruth Murray did during her lifetime. Essays may come from students in all majors and may take the form of analytic or critical essays, empirical research papers, or personal essays.

# The Gender and Sexuality Studies Program

The Center for the Study of Gender and Sexuality offers an undergraduate major and a minor. Students can focus solely on gender/sexuality studies or combine the major with another discipline to deepen their knowledge of how gender/sexuality impacts that subject.
