A Note from the Director

Dear CSGS community,

Spring is upon us (academically and meteorologically!) and I feel like I have found my feet as Faculty Director. I've benefitted from the wisdom and support of past directors, our outstanding staff, and curricular colleagues Kris Trujillo (Director of Studies) and Red Tremmel (Instructional Professor in CSGS). At the close of my first year, I'd like to share with you some of my priorities and upcoming initiatives.

I'm very sensitive to the fracturing of communities affected by the pandemic, the fallout of which remains visible in our classrooms, departments, and quads. For students and faculty who arrived during the COVID years, integrating into the campus and establishing intellectual and social networks was especially challenging. For these reasons I have sought to rebuild and expand the CSGS community by visiting departments to share opportunities available through CSGS, polling teaching fellows and junior faculty of all appointment types to see what kinds of events or activities might be valuable to them, and moving our meetings back in person. I'm particularly invested in supporting untenured colleagues, and to this end, we have created new collaborative research grants and manuscript workshop grants. We're hosting a reception for junior faculty and teaching fellows on Tuesday, March 19 from 3:00-5:00pm while also piloting a reading group and a weekly write-in for untenured colleagues, which, if successful, will continue next year. I cannot overstate how meaningful it was for me as a junior faculty

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person to be part of the CSGS community, and I hope that the Center will continue to play a positive role for younger scholars as they navigate the challenges of the early career years.

On the curricular side, the "Civ sequence" is ten years old! After starting with two sections/year, this year we're up to ten on campus and one abroad. We are revising the syllabi for the Gender and Sexuality in World Civilizations sequence, and next year will be undertaking a review of the GNSE major and minor. I also have been investigating opportunities to expand our collaborations with other academic units, and on this front am looking into how the graduate certificate in gender and sexuality might be adapted to other graduate programs, including in the BSD, and possibly the Pritzker School of Medicine. The BSD seems like a zone of under-tapped collaborative potential, and I hope to multiply the Center's connections to faculty and students in that area.

With respect to programming, I plan to take advantage of the specificity of my own academic background in Romance Languages and Literatures to organize a conference on RLL + CSGS. What are the consequences of thinking through questions of gender and sexuality in languages that are themselves grammatically-gendered? How have the practices and politics of scholarly translation shaped intellectual currents and produced differing trajectories of thought and distinct academic cultures? How has feminist translation reshaped the broader field of translation studies? These are some of the areas I hope to investigate at a multi-day conference to be held in the spring of 2025.

And finally, the Center is turning 30 in 2025-26! That might seem like a long way off, but planning is already underway. Our 25th anniversary was swallowed up by the Covid years, so I intend to make the most of our upcoming one by using it as an opportunity to take stock of the field, in both local and expansive terms. What transformations have occurred over the course of the past three decades in studies of gender and sexuality? How has the Center evolved to meet the changing needs and priorities of researchers and students at the University of Chicago, and how has the Center itself shaped intellectual life on our campus? What have our alumni/ae been up to out in the world? How can the Center position itself to be at the vanguard of intellectual production and political action in the coming decades? It's an exciting time for CSGS, and the work of the Center feels more urgent than ever.

I wish everyone a successful conclusion to this academic year and look forward to seeing and working with you in the next one!

Third Quarter of Gender Civ + Other Spring Courses

We've been planning for some time for our new optional quarter of Gender and Sexuality in World Civilizations (our extremely popular Core sequence) and we are excited to announce our pilot year with two sections taught by two of our Teaching Fellows. Jordan Johansen will be teaching Queens in a Global Context and Zoya Sameen will be teaching South Asia. We can't wait to hear what students have to say about this new topical option. Also this Spring, Prof. Linda Zerilli (Political Science/GNSE) will teach two sections of Advanced Theories of Gender and Sexuality and Instructional Professor Red Tremmel (GNSE) will debut Sexuality in U.S. History to 1900. The counterpart 1900-present will be taught next year. These are two of the Concepts courses for GNSE majors. Two Foundations courses for our majors are on offer in Spring: GNSE Teaching Fellow Sarah McDaniel will be teaching Living Queer: Experiences, Encounter, Affinities, and Rhiannon Love Auriemma (PhD Political Science, Northwestern University), will repeat her well-reviewed course, Contemporary Feminist Politics: From the Sex Wars to Beyonce. The UChicago LGBTQ+ Community Engagement Award

Nominations for the *LGBTQ+ Community Engagement Award*, a student prize sponsored by UChicago Alumni Pride and the Center, are due on April 1. The award is given annually to honor exceptional contributions that advance and support the interests of the LGBTQ+ community and is open to current UChicago undergraduate or graduate students in good academic standing. The awardee will receive a prize of \$500 and be honored with the opportunity to speak publicly about the significance of their work and introduce the invited distinguished speaker at the coming year's <u>OUTstanding Speaker Series</u> lecture. Undergraduate winners will be listed on the College Honors and Awards page. <u>Nominations</u> (including self-nominations) are due April 1. Eligible nominees will be notified in early April with a request to submit materials by April 29.

Ruth Murray BA Thesis Prize

Sunday, May 5 is the deadline for undergraduate students to submit their BA theses for consideration for the Ruth Murray BA Thesis Prize which rewards the best thesis written by a University of Chicago undergraduate student in the area of women's studies, feminist criticism, gender or sexuality studies. The \$500 prize sponsored by the CSGS is in memory of Ruth Murray, who died in 1991, having served as Bibliographer for the Education, Psychology, Sociology and Women's Studies Collections at the Regenstein Library for many years. Murray had a strong interest in encouraging scholarship in women's studies and often served as a stimulus and facilitator of work by students and faculty in the area. The essay competition sustains and encourages scholarship in gender and sexuality studies, as Ruth Murray did during her lifetime. Theses may come from students in all majors and may take the form of analytic or critical essays, empirical research papers, or personal essays.
